New Website Design

This past February saw the launch of the new Kensington Park Civic Association website! Developed by Creative Sarasota, LLC, the new design employs custom photography from around the neighborhood, a new color palette, refined font selections, new iconography, and tasteful visual effects like parallax, sticky navigation, dropdown menus, and image lightbox.

Since we were overhauling the design, we also decided to reorganize the information on the website. We took the copy that was once scattered randomly on various pages and pdfs and put it into a logical, hierarchical, parent-page-child-page structure. That structure is reflected in the main navigation at the top of the website, making it a ton easier to find information on the website.

But wait... there's more!

The site got more than just reorganized and a coat of new paint. The KPCA website has been modernized. Neighborhood Park Update



On April 6th, 2021 KPCA hosted representatives from Sarasota County's Planning and Development Services department, Neighborhood Services at the monthly KPCA member meeting. In person was Monet Moore, a Planner for Neighborhood Services and attending remotely was Elma Felix, Manager of Long Range Planning &

Neighborhood Services; Megan Barry, Community Outreach Specialist for Neighborhood Services; and Mike Socadeeter. Park Planner for Parks. Recreation & Natural Resources.

The presentation was primarily conducted by Elma. She started with a refresher of the park project including budget process, park location, park plan, and historical meeting notes. Next, she moved on to explain where the project was currently what the next steps are. Finally, Elma opened up the meeting to questions, of which there were many.

A Quick Review

Kensington Park used to have a water treatment facility on the corner of 27th Parkway and Monica Parkway. Long decommissioned, the lot sat unused for years. An initiative to turn the lot into a park started and in 2019 the old water treatment buildings were razed and the lot was prepared for a neighborhood park to be built. Then the Covid-19 pandemic hit and many government projects were put on hold, including our park.

In early 2021, the KPCA board reached out to the county to see if we could get an update and restart the project. The county was enthusiastic about getting this going again and helped to organize the meeting on April 6th.

What's Next?

The approximate completion time frame for the park is sometime in 2023. Here are the general tasks that need to be accomplished.

The county parks team has been working on rezoning the area to allow for the park, while also working on the park plan. This, they anticipate will be completed by the fall of 2021.

After the rezoning is completed, the team begins the process of getting permits to build the park. This is a long process that takes 6 to 9 months.

Next, they have to find a contractor to build the park and that takes about 3 months.

Finally, for a park this size they estimate it will take 3 to 6 months for construction.

That would put us somewhere in the middle of 2023 before the park is done. As we get more information, we'll be sure to post on the website and upcoming newsletters.

Questions and Answers

At the end of the county's presentation, Elma opened the floor up for some questions from attendees in the room and those attending online. Some of those questions and answers include:

- 1. Q. Will there be trash cans and regular trash maintenance?
 - A. Yes.
- 2. O. Will there be a fitness trail?
 - A. No, the park is too small for a fitness trail.
- 3. Q. Can Kensington Park Civic Assoc. host events at the park?
 - A. It was suggested that we work with Elma or Monet, but that temporary use permit would be required. It was also suggested that we could work out a circumstance for repeating, annual events.
- 4. Q. How does the county deal with smaller, spontaneous events like birthdays or family events?
 - A. No permits are needed for these types of events.
- 5. Q. Who is liable if someone gets hurt at the park? Sarasota County or Kensington Park Civic Assoc?
 - A. Sarasota County.
- 6. Q. How does the community address circumstances where someone is violating park usage?
 - A. As with all county violations, call the Sheriff's Department.
- 7. Q. Are dogs allowed?
 - A. Yes, but they must be on leashes.

8. Q. Will there be a dog bag dispenser for humans to cleanup after their dogs?

A. The county can incorporate that into the park plan.

Hurricane Kit Checklist

As the saying goes, "you don't know what you got til it's gone". When a hurricane hits, you could be without many things you take for granted. That's why we suggest you download the following checklist and go through it at the beginning of each hurricane season. Locate or buy those things that can be stored and put them in a convenient location. When a hurricane is spotted, don't wait. Go through the list and gather everything together.



A Well Stocked First Aid Kit

If you don't have a first aid kit, you need to either buy one or build one. If you buy one, the Red Cross has a wide assortment of kits randing from \$20 to \$280.



DIY FIRST AID CHECKLIST

If you're compiling your own kit, here are the items that the Red Cross suggest you have:

- 2 absorbent compress dressings (5 x 9 inches)
- 25 adhesive bandages (assorted sizes)
- 1 adhesive cloth tape (10 yards x 1 inch)
- 5 antibiotic ointment packets (approximately 1 gram)
- 5 antiseptic wipe packets
- 2 packets of aspirin (81 mg each)
- 1 emergency blanket
- 1 breathing barrier (with one-way valve)

- 1 instant cold compress
- 2 pair of nonlatex gloves (size: large)
- 2 hydrocortisone ointment packets (approximately 1 gram each)
- 13 in. gauze roll (roller) bandage
- 1 roller bandage (4 inches wide)
- 5 3 in. x 3 in. sterile gauze pads
- 5 sterile gauze pads (4 x 4 inches)
- Oral thermometer (non-mercury/nonglass)
- 2 triangular bandages
- Tweezers

Non-Perishable Food


When preparing your hurricane kit, you always want to have enough non-perishable food for at least 7 days. Here is a list of foods you can buy and store in advance of a hurricane.

- Canned Soup
- Canned or Bottled Juice
- Beans, Canned or Dry
- Nut Butters
- Dried Fruits
- Nuts and Seeds
- Dried Rice
- Granola and Protein Bars

Remember: if you buy things like uncooked rice, beans, pasta, ramen, etc, you will also need a way to cook them. Pack a small camp stove and mini propane tank.

It is always advisable to adhere to the expiration dates printed on a product's package.

Lifelines Yard Tour

On April 18th, Kensington Park Civic Association teamed up with KP resident Pamela Callender to host an educational talk and yard tour of Pam's property. Her yard acts as a living example of her new creation called *Lifelines*. Lifelines is an Eco Art project that designs and builds landscapes comprised of flora and fauna indigenous to the area.

Pam's landscapes are more than just beautiful. They are planned and created to serve necessary ecological functions. In addition to eradicating invasive plants, preventing monocultures, and updating landscape maintenance practices, they also provide habitats for local wildlife, including the all-important pollinators like bees and butterflies.

Forging relationships with Sarasota County, Kensington Park Civic Association, The Meadows, and other area organizations, Lifelines seeks to map out and transform neglected ecosystems into thriving habitats that connect both human and wildlife populations.

Peperomia (Peperomia humillis) A low growing ground cover, similar to a succulent in appearance. Must live in shade, minimal moisture. Can also grow well in pots and in the home.

Lakeside Twinflower (Dyschoriste humistrata) A very low growing, mounding plant used best as a border and where moisture collects. This plant has a tiny purple flower that attract pollinators and is a host plant for the Common Buckeye butterfly.

flowers and berries to attract both birds and butterflies. Prefers full sun, dry soil conditions

Blanketflower (Gaillardia puchella)
Another prolific grower in any conditions.
The mass bouquet will eventually die
back, however it will leave another to
grow in its place. This species just
announced non-native, is Florida
friendly.

Tea Bush (Melochia tomentosa) A 6-8' bush with striking silvery leaf and purple flowers year-round. The weeping branches are deep purple after a rain. This plant attracts hundreds of native bees on a daily basis.

Tickseed, Common (Coreopsis leavenworthii) A prolific flowering wildflower that spreads through reseeding. Popular nectar source. A wide range of growing conditions.

Building a Cleaner & Safer Kensington Park

Civic Associations & Code Enforcement

Kensington Park Civic Association is just that: a *Civic Association*. This means that we don't have things like deed restrictions, Homeowner Association (HOA) rules, or mandatory fees. Thus, our neighborhood is governed only by the codes and ordinances set forth by Sarasota County and, of course, Florida state law. As a result, Kensington Park has fewer restrictions pertaining to property and community maintenance compared to HOA neighborhoods. While our County codes are law and must be followed, they are much more than that. They are important guidelines that make your neighborhood safer and cleaner, help maintain higher property standards and values, and preserve and enhance the character of Kensington Park.

Common Code Mistakes

We have noticed that there are a few common code mistakes that residents make. These include overgrown grass, unlicensed or inoperative vehicles on property, loose trash for pickup, and construction materials in yards.

Waste Management: 941-493-4100





Home Repair Loans

Does your house need repairs? If you own your home and qualify as low-income, you may be eligible for a 0% deferred-payment loan for home repairs: new roof; air conditioner; plumbing; electrical; shower grab bars; door ramps.

Sarasota County provides a phone app allowing residents to submit photos of situations or damage directly to the County Public Works. Report issues with potholes, sidewalks, curbs, trash, street signs, etc.
